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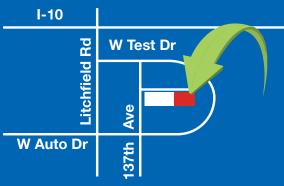
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Celebrate mom... and other mothers!

For years, Curtis and Lohan have wanted to revisit "Freaky Friday," and thanks to the Oscar that was bestowed to Curtis for Best Supporting Actress (for "Everything Everywhere All at Once"), they're finally going to get their wish. Curtis and Lohan will reprise their roles from the 2003 film for "Freaky Friday 2," due sometime in 2025 at the earliest.

Spring Cleaning and Safety

It's time to begin my annual spring cleaning, and this year it's going to be a bit different. Instead of just sticking with the window cleaning, closet organizing and dryer vent vacuuming type of activities, I'm going to concentrate on safety.

Grab bar in the shower: I'm going to bite the bullet and admit I probably should have one. I'll hire a handyman to make sure it's done right with the screws put into the studs so it won't come out.

New batteries in the smoke and carbon monoxide detectors: While the handyman is here, I'll have him install them because, yes, I've given up ladders.

Consider whether you want to add these ideas to your own spring cleaning list this year.

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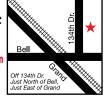
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Here's a Tip

What's the best way to keep sheet sets together? Tuck all the pieces in a matching pillowcase, of course.

Need to hull strawberries? Try using a straw. You position the straw at the bottom of the strawberry, then push up toward the stem. It works quickly and well.

If you mount a magnet strip in your bathroom or on your vanity, you can use it to hold bobby pins or metal barrettes. Or mount a ribbon to hold all kinds of hair clips.

If your entertainment electronics have a clock that is too bright, cover it with plain tape. You will still be able to read the time, but the tape will lessen the glare.

If new jeans are too stiff, add half a cup of salt to your wash water along with the regular detergent.

Have stubborn stains in the toilet? Put some teeth in your cleaning job by dropping in a denture-cleaning tablet and letting it sit overnight. In the morning, scrub and flush. It just might do the job.

Save power with this tip: Use cold water to wash towels and jeans. Then hang them to dry -- preferably outside, but on an inside line is OK, too. When they are mostly dry, pop them in the dryer on air dry to fluff up. Towels and jeans take the longest to dry in the clothes dryer, and use a lot of electricity.

Compensation for Service-Related Conditions

Service-connected injuries and conditions for which you can receive compensation can be either physical or mental. But there's no one-size-fits-all when it comes to how much compensation you can receive. Whether it's hearing loss or depression, or cancer or PTSD, each one has a different rating, which results in a different level of compensation.

The Department of Veterans Affairs disability rating you are assigned after being approved is based on the severity of your condition. Your compensation will be based partially on that and partially on whatever else might increase that compensation, such as having a family or a disabled spouse, or if you've suffered severe disability or loss of limbs.

And from there it gets even more complicated.

It's possible for your rating to change over time if your condition worsens, but even when combining multiple ratings (conditions) it's nearly impossible to reach 100% disability.

Increasing your final rating by combining smaller ratings (for multiple conditions) is difficult because there are rules, charts and math to consider. There is combining the numbers, converting, rounding up or down to the nearest 10. For example, you can't take a 20% rating and a 60% rating and come up with an 80% rating. In this case, the actual combined rating equates to 68%, but it's rounded up to 70%... because the chart says so.

Combining three or more disabilities is even more complicated. And nowhere on that chart is a rating of 100% disability.

A 100% disability rating, if given, can be temporary (until your condition clears up or gets better) or permanent if given for severe conditions such as blindness or loss of limb. But reaching that level without those severe conditions is difficult enough that whole legal websites across the internet are devoted to that one effort: getting a 100% disability rating.

To wade through the disability compensation ratings and benefits, go to www.benefits.va.gov/compensation/rates-index.asp#howcalc.

The ratings calculator can be found at www.va.gov/disability/about-disability-ratings.

The VA is currently taking 158 days to make decisions about claims.

Constant Aleve and Ibuprofen Consumption Can Cause Damage

DEAR DR. ROACH: My husband, age 70, has been diagnosed with osteoarthritis in his neck, for which he would take Aleve, when needed, to relieve his discomfort. Last year his back began hurting. His doctor said to get up and move more. (We have always been active, but he did slow down due to his pain.) My husband then added ibuprofen to the Aleve he was already using. His doctor said the pain is due to osteoarthritis in his mid-back area. Apparently, there is nothing to do for it but take Extra Strength Tylenol at the recommended dose. Ibuprofen or Aleve wasn't recommended because it causes liver and kidney damage, so he switched to Tylenol instead of Aleve and ibuprofen, but his pain only got worse.

He switched back to Aleve and ibuprofen. It helped before and is helping again. In addition, he is using a drug-free Aleve Direct Therapy pad that uses waveform technology. He also uses Icy Hot pain relief cream and a heating pad. These reduce his pain, but his back continues to hurt.

Should he use Aleve and ibuprofen instead of the Tylenol that doesn't seem to help? He has actually used Aleve for a very long time. He just had his blood tested, and the doctor said his liver and kidneys are good. Is there anything more we can do to relieve his osteoarthritic pain? -- S.F.A.

ANSWER: Osteoarthritis in the neck is a common and painful condition, and there are not always good treatment options. In terms of medicine, anti-inflammatory medicines, like Aleve or ibuprofen (Advil and many other brands), can be very helpful for some people.

However, taking both doesn't improve pain relief. It does increase the risk of toxicity, so he should never take two anti-inflammatory medicines — choose just one. Tylenol helps some people, but in my experience, most people do better with anti-inflammatories instead of Tylenol, which does have a smaller risk of side effects.

In addition to liver and kidney problems, Aleve and similar medicines can cause stomach problems, ranging from mild upset to life-threatening ulcers; though, this is uncommon with over-the-counter doses. I often recommend a trial of Tylenol to see if it is as good as the anti-inflammatories. Since it's not for your husband, he should tell his doctor, and it seems reasonable for him to go back to taking Aleve alone. However, I can't tell you to disregard his physician's advice. Some people benefit from Tylenol on top of Aleve.

The Aleve Direct Therapy pad uses electricity to relieve pain. It's fine to combine this therapy with medicines. Creams provide some relief, but they tend to be better on the hands, wrists and knees than the neck. In more severe cases, injections can be used before considering surgery.

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Nourish your vision with eye-friendly foods

The saying "you are what you eat" extends to the health of our eyes. Nutrition plays a crucial role in maintaining optimal vision and preventing eye-related issues. Include these specific foods in your diet to improve your eye health:

- Leafy greens. Vegetables like spinach, kale and collard greens are rich in antioxidants like lutein and zeaxanthin, known to protect the eyes from harmful high-energy light waves like ultraviolet (UV) rays.
- Omega-3 fatty acids. Fatty fish such as salmon, mackerel and trout are abundant in omega-3 fatty acids. These essential fats contribute to the structural support of cell membranes in the eyes and may help prevent age-related macular degeneration (AMD) and dry eyes.
- Colorful fruits and vegetables. Fruits and vegetables
 with vibrant colors like carrots, bell peppers and
 berries contain vitamins, beta-carotene and antioxidants that support overall eye health.
- Nuts, legumes and seeds. Almonds, walnuts, lentils, chia seeds and flaxseeds are rich in vitamin E and zinc, that promote retina health and prevent cataracts and AMD.
- Whole grains. Whole grains like quinoa, brown rice

- and oats contain vitamin E, zinc and niacin, contributing to overall eye health.
- **Water.** Staying hydrated is essential to maintain healthy eyes and prevent the symptoms of dry eyes.

May is Healthy Vision Month, so be sure to include these nutrient-rich foods in your daily meals to help maintain your vision. Remember, a well-balanced diet is a critical ingredient in the recipe for long-term eye health.

- 6. Bake in a preheated oven for 20 minutes or until biscuits are golden.

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Teaching an Old Dog New Tricks

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: After my aunt passed away, I gladly agreed to take in her dog, "Hunter," a rather squat, obese Beagle. He's a happy old dog of about 9 years, but my aunt gave him little to no training other than housetraining. That makes walking him -- something the vet recommended I do twice a day, in addition to a diet -- a chore. Hunter will walk a few steps, then sit down and refuse to budge. When he does feel like walking, he either tugs the leash forward or lags behind. How can I correct this? -- James T., Plano, Texas

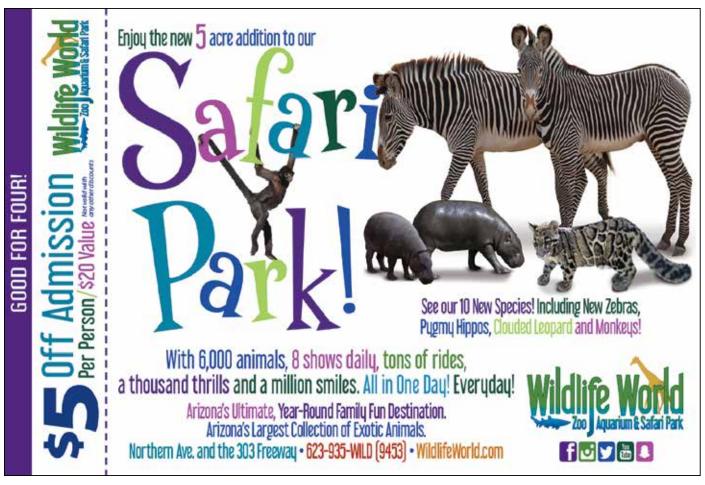
DEAR JAMES: Hunter is not used to the new lifestyle yet, and he's reacting in a predictable way. He's also out of shape and probably more stressed than you think. The first thing I prescribe is patience. The second thing I'd prescribe is persistence.

You'll want to gradually lengthen his walks. Each day, always at the same time, put Hunter on his leash and start the walk. As soon as Hunter begins to lag or tug forward, stop walking, adjust the distance so that he's standing or sitting next to you, and start again, saying, "Heel" as you step forward.

When he sits and won't budge, encourage him to go a few more steps by giving him a very small treat. Then turn around and go home. On your next walk, repeat this encouragement, going just a little farther. See what I'm getting at? Make each walk just a tiny bit farther.

As Hunter loses weight, learns to trust you and gains confidence on the leash, he will eventually pull you along. Time, patience and consistency will do the trick.

Pack your cooler like a pro!

Headed to the lake or taking the camper up north? To keep your food as fresh as possible follow this guide for packing your ice chest.

- Cook a few meals in advance and freeze everything that can be frozen, including meat and bottled water. These items will last longer and keep the cooler cold.
- Transfer food into airtight containers to prevent water from seeping in. This
 could cause bread to go soggy or lead to cross-contamination with meat.
- Put ice in the cooler a few hours before you leave so it's cold when you fill it.
- Place the most perishable items at the bottom of the cooler. Then, layer the
 rest of the food in the order you'll eat it (from the last meal to the first). This
 way, you can access what you need without emptying the entire cooler.
 Don't forget to put frequently used items on top!
- Put ice between each layer of food and top it off with more ice. This will
 ensure that the cold air circulates properly in the cooler. If the cooler isn't
 full, fill the gaps with ice cubes. If there are gaps, the ice will cool the air
 rather than the food and melt faster.
- If possible, keep drinks in another cooler so you don't have to open the food cooler as often.
- Finally, always leave your cooler in the shade to slow the melting process.

ICE BLOCKS OR ICE CUBES? Blocks of ice melt more slowly, while ice cubes fill empty spaces in the cooler. Therefore, a mixture of the two is ideal for keeping everything cold for a long time.
